





The cream tea at Wingfield church on 10th August was a great success. We were delighted to see so many people and a splendid (and much-needed) £535.90 was raised for church funds. Many thanks to Jacky Taylor and all her helpers for their work and their warm welcome.

Meanwhile our Harvest Festival service will be at 11.00 am on Sunday 6th October - all welcome, no need to book!

At the end of August we received the good news that we have been given approval from the diocese for the plans to repair the masonry in the tower and the south-west corner of the church. It has taken us a long time to get to this point, as we had to gauge the severity of the issues which had given rise to the need for the repairs, and we also had to assess the benefit of the tree surgery which was carried out last year. The specialist professional skills which we required for advice on what needs to be done are in short supply, and this caused further delay.

We need to raise about £130,000 to pay for the masonry repairs. We will not be able to afford it unless we are able to attract grants from major donor organisations, and they are only willing to support projects which have prior approval from the diocese. Now that we

All grant-awarding bodies need to see a contribution made by local fund-raising. We are very grateful for the local support which has enabled us to make a start on fund-raising, and we hope for further support as we continue with that fund-raising.

Donations are also very welcome, and if you, or someone you know, would be willing to contribute a donation, please get in touch.

We also hope to take advantage in the near future of a grant from the new diocesan Minor Repairs and Improvements Fund to repair some of our windows.

The Historical Re-enactment at The Cross, Syleham, was a huge success with over 200 people attending. The weather was kind, and the armies gathered ready to process to The Cross. Earl Bigod's army presented themselves at Syleham Manor with the kind permission of Andrew Napier and King Henry's army gathered at Monks Hall with the kind permission of Bonamy Grimes. The processions commenced with followers dressed in medieval costumes (*see front cover*) with medieval music to accompany them provided by The Windbags. The Ipswich Trump also accompanied King Henry's army, making the scene very authentic to the 12th century.

The re-enactment was met with laughter and cheers as people attending listened to the entertaining and amusing performance by the cast. Once the play had concluded Earl Bigod was put in the stocks and the children enjoyed throwing wet sponges at him! (see photo, page 17)

The event continued with an exhibition at the church celebrating the history of Syleham as a Suffolk village. The Windbags provided a further recital of medieval music and the exhibition also included an exact copy of the diary written by Charles Souter, now renamed the Syleham Diary, as

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Remembering

Brian Stannard

We were sorry to hear of the passing of Brian Stannard, who was living in Harleston but spent many years as a 'Sylehamite' at The Old White Horse in Syleham.

He was originally an industrial chemist in Hertfordshire with Leda Chemicals and after a couple of moves he started lecturing in London in 1965. He moved from Lawford to Colchester in about 1967 to improve his commute into the city. This he continued to do until he retired from lecturing and decided to move to Syleham in 1985.

Brian and his wife Margaret became valued members of the community. Initially doing some supply teaching, he retired from paid work entirely in 1989.

They worked on the house and garden, and Margaret kept sheep and chickens in the meadow but also became involved with many local activities. Brian became a parish councillor in Syleham in the days when Lt Col Leader was chairman and the meetings were held at Monks Hall. Brian had some stories to tell of those days.

As keen Methodists, Brian and Margaret joined the chapel in Fressingfield where Brian became Secretary for many years and continued to attend until very recently. He also became and remained

a trustee of The Goodwin Hall in Fressingfield. He was treasurer until recently, the hall now being the home of The Fressingfield Shed.

Having become interested in local drama, Brian joined Harleston Players and performed in many productions in the 80s and 90s. As well as playing Harry Trevor in 'Kiss me Kate', Antonio in 'Twelfth Night' and Howie Newsome in 'Our Town' Brian took on

'Our Town' Brian took on many pantomime roles and sometimes lent his services to other groups such as Brockdish Players. His varied interests also took him to volunteer at Bressingham Steam Museum where he got his hands dirty driving steam passenger trains around Bloom's nurseries.

His wife Margaret got interested in reflexology and gave treatments in the room that was originally the snug at the former pub, which was where the ladies were allowed to be in days gone by. After Margaret died in 2003 Brian moved again to

2003, Brian moved again to Harleston where he had lived ever since. A Town Councillor for 10 years, he also continued to become involved in many exercise and singing activities making new acquaintances all the time.

A cup-half-full person, Brian was always good company, upbeat and enthusiastic about life in general and very knowledgeable. Those who knew him would have been proud to do so. Our condolences go to his daughter Gina, sons Anthony and Christopher and family.

John Chapman

John Alan Chapman, formerly of Hoxne, passed away on 7th August 2024.

John was born in Plumstead London in 1932, one of five children having three brothers and one sister.

He left school around the age of 14 when his first job was telegram boy delivering around London on his bike.

After national service he went on to be a milkman, a job he held for over 20 years.

In 1955 he married his beloved wife Jean and they went on to have three children - Mike, Paul and Sue.

In 1973 the



Chapmans departed from London for a better quality family life and to take over the village stores in Low Street, Hoxne. They ran the business for 14 years before semi-retiring to a bungalow around the corner.

John and Jean played a large part in village and church life, being on many committees. They were involved with youth clubs, carnivals, the magical event of Father Christmas, inter-village sports, friends of the church and much more.

John was a dedicated family man and couldn't have been more proud of his large, ever-growing family... his legacy.

The family wishes to thank everyone for their words of comfort and kind thoughts about their dear dad. A NURSE'S TALE

In the mid-1960s I trained as an SRN at a London teaching hospital and later came to live in Hoxne.

In those days there were three intakes a year of upwards of 70 student nurses (nursing and teaching were main routes of higher education for young women at that time) - about 210 annually!

The hospital Matron was a powerful matriarch who was without exception a formidable leader, greatly respected by everyone, including the almost exclusively male medical staff. As a nurse she understood that nursing excellence was essential for the successful outcomes of medical treatment and one of her priorities was the training experience.

Some years later as a young mum I entered Kath Priddy's shop, (now the Old Bakery in Low Street) and was very much taken aback to see the upright and precise figure of Miss Downton, the Matron. I was speechless and I thought mistaken; I remained silent. After she left I asked Kath Priddy if she knew who she was - "Never seen her before," was Kath's reply. I have often reflected on this encounter and wondered if I was correct!

In Hoxne church there is a framed list of past vicars, including Henry Murray Downton 1883 and Cecil Downton 1887. To the left of the altar on the north wall is a shieldshaped plaque of dedication for the credence table beneath, inscribed to the memory of Henry Murray Downton.

Revd Henry was married with eight children when in 1887 he was taken ill and died in a short space of time. His widow and their children, the youngest being only one month old, went to live at Scole House and later Hall Hills in Diss. The living at Hoxne was subsequently taken by one of Henry's brothers, Cecil, who lived there with two 'spinster' sisters until 1909. There is a burial enclosure somewhere in the churchyard.

Miss Downton's father was Basil Downton (Henry's second child) born in 1878, who would have been about 9 years old and living at Hoxne Vicarage when his father died. Cecil must have had strong memories of Hoxne from those years, from his father's and then his uncle's time there. Basil married Ernestine Helen Castelain in 1907 and they had 6 children, the second of whom was Helen M Downton, born in 1909.

Miss Downton was a young child growing up during the First World War, and a woman in her prime working as a nurse during the Second.

Professionally, she was progressive and proactive in the syllabus and training experiences of nurses of that period. Her 1961 published paper considering 'The General Nurses Training and Psychiatry' (Helen M Downton, Matron University College Hospital) was a response to 'The Mental Health Act' of 1959 and was influential in the introduction of a psychiatric secondment option for general nurse students.

She was also a granddaughter and great niece of Hoxne Vicarage who came to visit and remember and reflect on her roots after her retirement from a life of service to the nursing profession. She died in 1994.

Hoxne Post Office & Shop

Here are some facts about Hoxne village shop and post office.

1. The shop and post office have now closed.

2. The post office has given the village up to six months in order to arrange a rescue package that will see the post office and shop reopen.

3. Hoxne Community General Stores Ltd, the body formed in order to buy and run the shop and post office had over the last two years organised a variety of financial support through grants and financial pledges in order to buy the freehold of the shop premises and undertake essential repair work along with internal modifications in order to enlarge the shop.

4. The change of government has meant that one of those sources of financial support has been frozen pending new policy decisions.

5. The Community Group now has a shortfall of some £254,000 in order to achieve its goal. The Group is now investigating other ways of at least buying the premises in order to allow the current owner to move and retire.

6. Hoxne Parish Council is in discussions with the Group to find alternative sources of funding.

7. Please note Hoxne Parish Council is under no obligation to make up for this financial shortfall, nor has it offered to do so at the time of writing.

However, The Parish Council can take out what is called a Public Works Loan, at a favourable rate of interest in order to undertake large capital projects. This was last done in order to replace the ageing street lights in the village and this loan has now been paid off. The criteria for taking out a loan are very strict indeed, including community support (this may include a referendum) and central government approval. The Parish Council must demonstrate that it has the means to repay the loan without affecting its statutory duties. The Council must also show that it has acquired a tangible asset in using this loan. The Parish Council has an annual income of roughly £14,000 through its share of Council Tax. The taking out of any sizable loan therefore would mean paying back any debt over many years.

Discussions on reopening the shop are at a very early stage. You, as a council tax payer in the parish of Hoxne, will be kept informed of developments as they happen and your views will be sought.

Traffic management

The traffic management proposals have now been finalised and written up into a report to present to Suffolk County Council Highways Authority. We now await their views on whether our proposals can be implemented. May I take this opportunity to thank councillors Lagerberg, Kruszewski, Lerwill, Herron and Mr Paul Somers for their diligence and determination in completing this report. 
