

St Peter & St Paul's, Hoxne

I sat at the computer ready to write and my mind went blank - and then I remembered reading on social media of somebody from another Benefice complaining about their church being locked over the holiday season.

Hoxne church was unlocked every day, thanks to our dedicated team of volunteers. I do understand the problem though. Many people go to spend Christmas and New Year with relatives so the pool of volunteers becomes smaller; things do go wrong, people get sick, washing machines spring a leak... Back in the summer the church remained closed for a few hours because plaster had fallen in the porch of the church.

However we do aim to open the church every day; in the winter months from 9am to 4pm and summer months 9am to 5pm and everyone is welcome in. But please remember that the key holders are volunteers, and if they are 10 minutes late there will be a good reason.

I was asked if I could attach to my report some exciting words about the churchyard, and in a way it is about 'volunteering'. The PCC is delighted to announce that we have been able to secure the services of the Community Payback Scheme to assist us with the maintenance of the churchyard. The Scheme is operated by the Probation Service and involves individuals who have found themselves in a situation where they are required to give something back to the community as part of their rehabilitation. The group will be working in the churchyard for a few hours on the fourth Saturday of each month, beginning on Saturday, 25th January. There will be up to six individuals who will be fully supervised at all times by the Probation Service and members of the church will also be getting involved. This is a fantastic opportunity to not only get on top of the churchyard with regard to maintenance, but also to forge links and help in the rehabilitation of those who have, for whatever reason, found themselves in a difficult place.

The church is excited to be involved in this project. It is hoped over the coming months to be able to concentrate on areas of the churchyard that need some work, such as redefining the car park, defining some of the paths, sorting out rogue saplings growing through graves and keeping the sheds, benches and gates in good order.

The PCC is very grateful to those individuals who regularly attend family graves in the churchyard and help to keep things looking tidy and we do hope you will continue to be involved if you are able.

It is intended to develop the wilding of some areas of the churchyard to help with wild flora and fauna, and to create a nature trail with information boards, as there are some ancient and very interesting parts of the churchyard that would be of great interest to the community.

Finally, church coffee mornings resume on **15th March** at 9.45am - we hope to see you there.

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
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
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Hoxne Garden & Social Club

Bulmer Brick and Tile Company

On Tuesday 18th of March our series of talks continue at the village hall in Hoxne. This time we are pleased to welcome Peter Minter of Bulmer Brick and Tile Company. In the words of Peter Minter, "My father, Lawrence Minter, took over this brickworks in 1936 when he was thirty-five. It had been here for hundreds of years, with the earliest evidence dating from 1450, and it was a typical local brickworks. His uncle, FG Minter, was a builder in London and my father was brought up by him as a surveyor.

"Before my father could get established, the war came along and shut the place down. There were thirty-five or thirty-six people working here but a lot got called up and we went down to about six or seven men. We made land drainpipes for the Ministry of Supplies, and that was what kept us going. Those men were old or infirm, but they kept the skills alive.

"I was taught by those skilled men who had been born in the nineteenth century and brought up as brick makers. Without realising, I learned all the old secrets of brick making but it was only when I knew that this was the direction of my life that I decided I had to save it and started using the old techniques that had been forgotten rather than the new. This is what makes us unique.

"I have spent my whole life working here and I probably know more about making bricks than anyone alive. The business has changed and yet it has not changed, because the essence is the same.

"When my father reopened after the war, everything was already beginning to change. There was so little trade in brick-making that he got into the restoration business."

As usual, this talk will start at 7.30pm and will cost £5 at the door (or just £3 for HHG members). The bar will be open from 7pm and all members of the public are welcome.

We went on a trip to Mellis Common, having heard it was a good place for a walk. What I hadn't expected to find was probably the best homewares shop in this area. It's a unique, family-run business, full of items that look as though they've been chosen with real care. It's huge, full of beautiful furniture and interesting things for the home, with a Clearance hall. We bought a sofa in the sale; there were also lovely leather handbags, prices reduced by 25%, which I managed to resist.



Here is an extract from Suffolk Wildlife Trust's description of Mellis Common:

"While many great commons were enclosed and lost forever, Mellis somehow escaped this fate and now provides a glimpse of what large parts of the county used to look like. If the land itself is the same - the Hodgkinson's 1783 map of Suffolk depicts an outline of the Common that is entirely recognisable -



the same is also true of the management techniques used to look after it.

Farmed by the common-rights holders using traditional hay cutting and grazing for centuries, the Trust continues to manage it in largely the same way today, ensuring the site retains its fragile blooms and abundant wildlife. In summer rare plants such as green-winged orchid, sulphur clover and adder's tongue fern flourish, while the abundance of small mammals also makes the site a favourite hunting ground for barn owl and tawny owl.

"Once a source of clay for building, the Common is awash with ponds and wet depressions that add to the variety of plant and animal life, including great crested newts. The western end of the Common is botanically poorer due to the fact that it was ploughed and farmed more intensively during World War II but is still culturally interesting. Residents tell stories of how local children would police the gates that used to enclose cattle, earning pennies from the passing traffic.

"A good place to start any walk around the Common is from the village's eyecatching red phone box, now complete with stained glass windows, but it is worth noting Mellis is no ordinary

reserve. This is not a place of tracks and trails, but a living breathing farmed landscape to be explored and enjoyed - something captured so beautifully by the village's most famous resident, the late, great Roger Deakin."

New Reeding Woods

The winter sun was shining as I walked through the woods in early January. The ground was water-logged and the pond full. and tidy though damp. Hopefully the bird boxes will be used this year and possibly the owl box as well.

Walking in the meadow always lifts my spirits and I hope that it will be enjoyed by all who visit this year. Winter should be on its way out and spring arriving when you read this.

Flash Fiction

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I've really struggled with my money and have already spent too much on Christmas. I also recently got caught out by a free trial on an app that rolled into a paid subscription. Even without this though, it feels like every month I end up in my overdraft. How can I keep track of my spending better?

Lots of people will be feeling this way right now, and it can be difficult to stay on top of things like online subscriptions. But there are steps you can take to be more in control of your money.

Firstly, draw up a budget. Remember to include all of your general spending, and any other bills you have to pay. Be realistic about what you'll need for essentials like food and travel. If your income fluctuates, use bank statements, benefit award letters and Universal Credit journals to plan your budget each month.

Your bank should be able to tell you what regular payments you have. If you find subscriptions you don't want, contact the company in question to cancel them. In future, before signing up to anything, make sure you know what you'll get, for how long and what it'll cost. If you do use any free trials, set a reminder a week before the free period ends so you've time to cancel it if you want to. Keep evidence of any subscription cancellations in case you need it in the future.

If you've been relying on your overdraft lots this year or turned to credit cards or Buy-Now-Pay-Later, it's understandable if this worries you. Always prioritise paying your rent, mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first though, because not paying these has the most serious consequences. If you're having trouble managing your debts and paying bills, contact Citizens Advice for support.

Shreeves Farm Housing Development

By the time you read this Mid Suffolk Council as the planning authority for this area will have made a decision on the Shreeves Farm development at the end of the Denham Road, Heckfield Green. This proposal for 40 new houses was expected, being part of the Hoxne Neighbourhood Development Plan voted for and approved in a local referendum held last year. Although it does not have the power to block planning applications, Hoxne Parish Council does have the ability to scrutinise planning applications, large and small, giving recommendations as to whether the planning application should go ahead, sometimes specifying certain conditions. It is, however, Mid Suffolk Council that make the ultimate decision. Therefore on reading this Hoxne Parish Council will have also studied the Shreeves Farm development making its own recommendations or proposals. All planning applications in the Mid Suffolk Council area can be seen on their planning portal website.

Parish Orchard

On Saturday 18th January some of your parish councillors, along with a group of volunteers, were busy tidying up the parish orchard in Heckfield Green. This is a public area open to all and as the names suggests contains a selection of fruit trees. Some of these, along with other shrubs, were carefully pruned and the invading undergrowth cut back. Hopefully, as spring arrives this will make for a much pleasanter area in which to spend some time.

Village Spring Clean

In a similar vein, the Village Spring Clean is due to take place on **Sunday 23rd March**, 10.00am start at the village hall. A team of volunteers will go around the village picking up litter ready to be collected the following day by the refuse collection service.
