

Bright hope for tomorrow

The news is full of frightening and difficult items at present, internationally and economically. Our world has suddenly become much more threatening. We may well be asking, Where is God in this? And the answer is very clear as we move through the final weeks of Lent and into Holy Week and Easter. Jesus Christ came into the world to share our human frailty and our troubles, even to the point of death, and we share his journey in these weeks. But the good news is that he rose again from the dead on Easter Day and his resurrection offers us the hope that we can share that too and rise with him to eternal life. Meanwhile he has sent his Holy Spirit to encourage and strengthen us as we go forward through the changes and chances of this world.

So God gives us strength for today, whatever it brings, and bright hope for tomorrow, as the hymn 'Great is thy faithfulness' says. Bright hope for tomorrow is also the theme of the diocesan Lent Appeal for our link diocese in Kagera, an area badly affected by climate change. The aim through the appeal is to support farming initiatives and good practice in agriculture, training of evangelists and clergy and resourcing of pastors in their parishes, as well as support for healthcare in the region through the Diocesan hospital. 

St Margaret's remains open daily and the church and environment provide a welcome place of tranquility - visitors' comments show how much it is appreciated.





Timber Framed Buildings and Traditional Oak Carpentry

On the 20th May all members of the public are invited to Hoxne village hall again for a talk titled Timber Framed Buildings and Traditional Oak Carpentry which will be given by Rick Lewis. Rick leads a small but dedicated group of skilled timber-frame carpenters able to repair historic frames or frame new buildings to your specification. They have many years experience of vernacular framing traditions and work only to the highest standards. Rick started life as an everyday site carpenter but became disillusioned with the industry and nearly quit to study medieval art history. By chance a local contractor sent him to repair a Suffolk church, and he has been studying medieval architecture ever since gaining knowledge from obscure books, attending lectures and talking to other framers, but most of all by closely observing the historic framing of our region. Having repaired over 100 timber framed buildings and visited many more in his spare time, Rick has had a rare insight into vernacular carpentry; and the future of Traditional Oak Carpentry is in safe hands with Rick's son Henry already showing an interest in the tools of the trade.

As usual this talk will start at 7.30pm and will cost £5 at the door (or just £3 for HHG members). The bar will be open from 7pm and all members of the public are welcome.

Hoxne Shop & Post Office

Hi everyone,

As you will know the Community Ownership funding was pulled in May last year and hasn't been replaced. We have sought alternative funding, so far without success.

In November the Community Benefit Society and Hoxne Parish Council jointly commissioned a revaluation of the property, which came out as £375,000 (compared with 400,000 in 2023). We made a new offer for the building but unfortunately this lower offer was not acceptable to the owner.

Our existing business plan

Our existing business plan has been under increasing pressure, due to:

- Additional costs (such as increases in projected salaries on the adding of loan interest repayments).
- Lower sales forecasts for the first year (as the business has now being closed for a long period).
- The increased likelihood that we will lose the favourable community branch contract from the Post Office (the deadline for applying is May and we need to own the building before we can do that).

Considering the above, we decided to pause the project and reassess our aims and objectives.

A change of plan - the Post Office

We now believe that the plan will have to change radically to have a good chance of success. In very rough numbers, the Post Office in Hoxne would cost £60k in costs to run and would bring in £17k of operating profit. Given the additional financial pressures, the Post Office operation appears unaffordable, particularly as we would be borrowing money to buy the building.

Given all of the above we believe we have no option but to develop a new plan, one which we believe can still meet most of the community's needs:

- To put our energies into opening a community shop without the Post Office.
- To make it an entirely volunteer-run enterprise.
- To offer as many additional services as we can (such as parcel collection and access to cash) to offset the loss of the Post Office as much as possible.

New location, new building

As the current Post Office location on Low Street is now unaffordable, we are forced to look for an alternative. We have previously scoured the area for suitable alternatives (with no success) so we are considering a plan for a new building. There are advantages to this approach, notably:

- It can be cheaper to buy land and erect a new building rather than buy an old one and repair it.
- Ongoing running costs are lower for a new building.
- It can be purpose-built to meet our requirements.

With that in mind we are now in search of land that might be appropriate - somewhere that is next to a road, ideally centrally located so that it is within easy reach of all the community. Can you help with suggestions or ideas? Please get in touch with the team.

Hoxne Phoenix Group

We had a last minute change of programme at the start of the year and fortunately were able to welcome Moira Cook to entertain us. Fressingfield Scouts

Normal activities soon resumed after the Christmas break, mostly indoors at this time of year though Explorers and Adventurers Scouts had a Caber Tossing Highland Games session as part of a Burns



Night event. The other "Scottish" activities included Tug of War, potato racing (pushing a potato along the floor with your nose!) and Haggis and Neeps and Tattie tasting. A good evening with lots of laughter and a little Robert Burns poetry!

Pioneer Troop Scouts spent an evening building bird boxes. At the end of the session they had

They also made posters showing the many clubs and facilities in Fressingfield. They have started work on the Communication Badge and have worked hard at the Astronomy Badge.

Our youngest Section, Squirrels, have had great fun making bird feeders and also had a local focus with thinking about all the people with roles in our local villages that make the area so pleasant to live in. They decided these were our "Local Heroes".

Tigers Cubs acknowledged Chinese New Year with a session of Chinese cooking which went very well, the food was good and the washing up was enthusiastically tackled. Another week the Cubs were challenged to use pasta and cardboard tubes to build a tower that could support

a 400g tin of tomatoes. The tallest tower was made of 3 sheets of lasagne, 3 toilet roll tubes and some Sellotape!

Both Beaver colonies have started with games evenings. A favourite seems to be the "Christmas card game" where the leaders cut the pictures from lots of



cards into four pieces and spread them around the room, then the young people have to try and find the pieces to make whole cards again. This is very energetic and usually extremely noisy but great fun!

Adventurers Scouts were out and about one evening on a "Dump Hike" where they were taken in the minibus and dropped in the countryside with maps and compasses and had to make their own way back to the HQ. Look up - you will see the unexpected!

John Betjeman always said when passing buildings, 'Look up, you see so much more'. The same can be said for trees, especially those that are not native to us in England.



Two Big Trees in Selbourne House, Harleston

When you next go into Harleston, just opposite the Market Square in the front garden of Selbourne House, look up and you will see two very special examples of a tree that comes from California. Its Latin name is Seauoiadendron giganteum, more commonly known as the 'Big Tree'

or the 'Wellingtonia', named after the Duke of Wellington. Selbourne House, dating back to the seventeenth century, had a new front in the 1850s which is when these two fine saplings would have been planted, as they arrived in England in 1853 and became the height of Victorian garden fashion.

Like old buildings, trees also have a history, and the Big Tree has been around for about 3000 years and is one of the tallest on the planet. The largest collection is in the Sequoia National Park in the Sierra Nevada in east central California, where some still standing have grown to over 275 feet.

The Big Tree came to England in a special consignment of seeds from a young plant hunter called William Lobb. William was sent to the Americas by his employer, the famous Veitch and Sons Nursery of Exeter in Devon, to search for

new and exotic trees and plants to excite the Victorian gardener. On one of his plant hunting expeditions in California, William found a grove of these Big Trees and thought they were so special that he collected as many small seedlings, cones and seeds as he could carry, and rushed to get the first ship home to Devon.

William's rush meant that Veitch and Sons became the first to introduce the Big Tree into England. As soon as William's haul had arrived at the nursery they started to propagate and grow on the seedlings and within a few months were able to offer the saplings for sale. Veitch placed advertisements in all the gardening press of the period, such as The Gardeners Chronicle, extolling the virtues of this new and wonderful introduction to gardens, selling each small sapling for three pounds two shillings which in the 1850s was an enormous amount of money. And this is probably where the owner of Selbourne House or

his gardener saw and purchased the two saplings which are still growing today.

You can find the Big Tree in most of the gardens belonging to the National Trust, English Heritage and other large estates, as well as some parks. But if you cannot get to one of those, next time you are going west on Green Street in Hoxne, and you get to the traffic calming

measure and have to wait, look up to your left and you will see a very fine specimen of the Big Tree, all the way from California.

New Reeding Woods

March came in like a lamb and as we have more work to do up at the woods let's hope it does not go out like a lion.

The mild weather towards the end of February allowed us to catch up on outstanding work at the woods. The pond needed a clean-out as it was filling with weed, so two intrepid group members donned waders and braved the cold waters. A lot of weed was raked out and then in keeping with the advice "take out as much as you think and then the same again," more was removed. Other members of the working group raked the weed out and it was left at the side of the pond to allow creatures in it to make their way home. The water has now cleared and the ducks have been enjoying the clear areas. The newts will return later in the season to breed and take advantage of the increased space.

A second work session was held later in the month to remove the old wire fence up by the pond. This was in poor repair and was no longer needed. Now it has been removed the meadow area at the top will be easier to mow. Additionally, we will be able to ensure that the ditch is kept clear and running well. A new fence was put in by the top gate replacing the fence there.

More work is planned to replace the pipe under the gate entrance, again to improve the ditch drainage and we will also improve the areas around the pedestrian gates as they have become very muddy. The ground currently looks churned up but this will be left until all work has been finished.

Having made a mess at one end of the woods a new hawthorn was planted at the edge of the top meadow in memory of Michael Reeves, one of our founder members. It will provide a splash of colour in spring in the years to come.

If it seems too good to be true, it probably is! (a scam)

In these days of almost everything being online, we are increasingly "doing stuff" online shopping, appointments, communication (emails, messaging, social media etc.) These all make us vulnerable to letting

is the UK Police resource centre for fraud reporting and prevention advice. Unfortunately, it seems to be more targeted towards business than the ordinary consumer. However, it does offer up some excellent points regarding online shopping advice.

Where to shop online

If it's a company or person you don't know and trust, do some research. Ask your friends or family for advice before committing to the transaction. Always use a credit card rather than a debit card if you can as they offer better fraud protection.

Keep your device up to date

Computer or mobile phone, ensure you have the latest updates! These often contain important security features that can protect you.

Keep your email account very secure

Your email account can be used to recover most, if not all your passwords so make sure it is very secure. Always use a strong unique password, especially for email and do not share it with anyone, ever!

Turn on two-factor authentication (2FA)

To give any online account additional protection, turn on two-factor



authentication (2FA) if it's an option. 2FA is a way for a service to double check that you really are the right person to be logging in.

Password managers

Do not re-use passwords. A way

around this is to use a password manager. These help you use strong complex passwords without forgetting them. As with email, make sure you use a strong master password and don't share it ever!

Don't give your information away

Obvious details that an online store needs like address and bank details are necessary. However, be cautious if they ask for details that are not required for your purchase. Not your mother's maiden name, the name of your primary school or pet cat!

Beware of links in emails and texts

Some of the amazing offers you receive via email or text messages can contain links to fake websites, designed to steal personal information and money. Not all links are bad, but if you are unsure, ask friends or family.

If things go wrong

Scams can be incredibly convincing and it's easy to fall foul. If you believe you've been scammed, you can report it to Action Fraud and your bank. Also keep an eye on your bank transactions and contact them immediately about anything to don't recognise, however small.

It all boils down to practising common sense - if it looks too good to be true, it generally is. If you are unsure about anything, stop! Ask for advice - a second pair of eyes can often spot a problem you've missed. Don't get caught out and become another victim; stay safe online folks.

Hoxne

If you live within the Parish of Hoxne and pay Council Tax then first the bad news. Hoxne Parish Council is for the year 2025/26 increasing its share of Council Tax by 50%. For a Band D property this means an increase of £19.68 spread over the whole year. This is the first time since 2023 that Hoxne Parish Council has increased the charge in its share of Council Tax, which because of the way in which the tax is calculated has been smaller than that charged in 2021. Also, our share of your total Council Tax bill is comparatively small with the remainder being charges made by Suffolk County Council, Mid Suffolk District Council, the Suffolk Police and Crime Commissioner. There is also an additional charge made by Suffolk County Council for adult social care. Nevertheless you may ask why Hoxne Parish Council has had to ask for such an increase in its share of the precept?

During the last year the council has given financial support to the Community Benefit Society in the quest to try and save the village shop and post office. It has also given donations to such local

groups as the Garden and Social Club, Hoxne Heritage Group, Hoxne Playing Fields, and Suffolk Accident Rescue. All of these groups have been directly involved in enriching the life of the village, or in helping residents with lifethreatening emergencies. This is in addition to maintaining and improving the village infrastructure such as noticeboards, the village green shelter, village gateway signs, litter bins, as well as employing a village caretaker. There have also been legal costs to cover in relation to future land transfers. Over the last year the Council has also been engaged in developing traffic management proposals which it is hoped will lessen the impact of traffic through the village. If approved by the Highways department of the County Council and the police they will cost considerable amounts of money to implement.

Yet, all this has been done by Councillors who give freely of their time, receiving no expenses for attending monthly council meetings or any extra meetings they may have to attend. Their reward is hopefully making Hoxne a better place in which to live.

There are now two vacancies on Hoxne Parish Council if you would like to help in making Hoxne a great place to live in. Please get in contact with the Parish Clerk who can give details.

On Sunday March 23rd volunteers completed a Village Spring Clean and we are grateful for all the efforts to keep the village clean and litter free.

If you like spending time outdoors to keep our village looking at its best, the Parish Council is currently advertising for a Street Caretaker (20 hours per month with flexible working hours). Further details are on the Parish Council website at: pc@hoxne.suffolk.gov.uk
