EXHUMING A GHOST PROPERTY – THE HISTORY OF SYLEHAM HALL

Local historian Stephen Poulter, at the helm of the Souter Diary Project, shares the twists and trials of his mission to uncover the story of Syleham Hall Farm's long-lost Victorian villa, tragically lost to fire in 1919. He tells a fascinating story that stretches back to the medieval manor house acquired by the powerful De La Poles at Wingfield in the 14th century. The narrative covers two centuries of ownership by the wealthy Barry family, who built an Elizabethan Hall and later replaced it with a Georgian residence. It also explores the subsequent expansion and alterations made by the villa's two Victorian owners. Alongside the grander history are glimpses into the lives of villagers-tenant farmers and agricultural workers—who toiled on the estate.

St Peter & St Paul's, Hoxne

The last time I wrote I promised a summary of the Annual Parochial Church Council meeting. There were no surprises: Guy McGregor and Wilf White were re-appointed church wardens, and the membership of the PCC remains as is listed on the cover of this month's Village Voice.

The Electoral Roll has been updated. The numbers have reduced from 34 to 24, but we are hoping that a few people may

not have yet returned their applications.

Fundraising

The Church wardens reported that the work on the bell project is ongoing; we do need to get 'faculty', which is the equivalent to planning permission, before we do any serious fundraising. It is hoped that the recent revision to the rules for lottery funding, which are seen as placing greater emphasis on historic church buildings in rural communities and on encouraging participation in the use of such buildings, will be helpful to us.

In addition we have just had our quinquennial inspection which sets out what work is needed and with what degree of urgency. The report identified £14,000 to £20,000 of urgent work and a further £60,000 to £84,000 of work needed to be done in the next 12 months. Some of these items will be dealt with as part of the bells project.

Churchyard work

Since January 2025 the churchyard has been benefiting from the services of the Community Payback Scheme which is run by the Probation Service. We are already seeing the benefits of this excellent scheme which helps us to maintain the churchyard while also assisting in the rehabilitation of participants. Of course there are some in the village who think that we are going too far with tidying the churchyard but we are aiming to get the balance just right.

We are delighted to report that the Revd Canon Eleanor Goodison is now our Rector and not just our Priest in Charge. That gives her and us greater security and should mean that our benefice that's the number of churches for which she is responsible - will not be reorganised while she remains in post.

Card payments!

Finally, I am pleased to say that Hoxne Church can now take card payments, so if you want to donate you can do so without cash. I understand that all donations under £50 qualify for a gift aid allowance, whether the donor is a tax

payer or not. You as an individual do not have to do anything but for every £1 you donate we can claim an extra 25p. It soon adds up!


We also need volunteer recorders in the church on 13th September, so if you are able to help us by giving up an hour or two to perform this important task please let me know.

Engraved Copper Plaque - St Edmund

A small, extremely blackened, metal plaque (10 x 6.5mm; 4 x 2.75ins) was found in the desk in the vestry of St Peter and St Paul's church this May. With Brasso to the rescue, it was transformed into a bright, shiny copper printing plaque, depicting the martyrdom of St Edmund.

It shows a central figure kneeling, holding a cross up to a figure standing in front of a tree. This is probably Bishop Humbert (Edmund's mentor) pleading with Edmund to deny his faith and become a vassal King.

The Danes are menacing from the right with an archer preparing a long bow and another holding a flag.

The haloed figure standing in front of a tree with his hands over his heart shows the martyred St Edmund. His clothes and crown lie at his feet with a wolf behind in the distance, near bushes, with possibly St Edmund's well. (This feature can still be seen to the left of the St Edmund monument on Oak Hill.)

The faint inscription at the top right reads (back to front):

St Edmund Rex et Mart 870 AD (St Edmund King and Martyr 870 AD)

On the back of the plaque is impressed Dobbs & Co, who were in business from 1803 to 1893 when they were acquired by The Sandle Brothers of Paternoster Row, London. Dobbs & Co produced decorated and embossed paper and were also engravers.



Was this commissioned in 1870 - the 1000th year since Edmund's martyrdom? Is there an old book in someone's bookcase from a long gone relative - possibly when a Sunday School child - when this image might have been used for a presentation item? Is there a sleuth out there who can trace the whereabouts of the Order Books of Dobbs & Co circa late-1860s? Might the church PCC minutes reveal some information?

HOXNE'S LOST PALACE - Part II

Following the Norman invasion, the great Domesday Survey of 1086 recorded that in the manor (Hoxne), there is "the seat of the Bishopric". Eight years later Bishop Herbert de Losinga settled on Norwich as the centre of the East Anglian Diocese, where he was to construct a wonderful cathedral.

Many decades passed before one of his successors, Thomas de Blumville, moved the monks from the old palace at Hoxne to their new home - a chapel and subsequently a priory, which was completed

in 1267 on land where Abbey farm now stands in Cross Street. It was, therefore, decided to build a new episcopal palace on a site to the west, close to the River Dove, which was nearer to the centre of the village. (This later became known as Hoxne Hall).

The palace was probably timber-framed and

thatched and may have incorporated flint and some stone. It was surrounded by a moat and a number of outbuildings, such as granges, an oxhouse, malthouse, granary, and a large edifice called the "Logge", suggesting it was a self-sufficient set-up, similar to a farm. An area of land was enclosed around the house and turned into a deer park of just over 500 acres. By 1326, when the first written mention of the new palace occurs on a compotus, or annual account of the Bishop's reeve Stephen Mose, it would seem that the house and

outbuildings were by then in a state of considerable disrepair. Thatchers were employed to re-roof several buildings and other labourers to re-board the granary and wattle partitions in the Logge - as well as mending broken-down fences and bridges, for which hundreds of feet of timber planks were purchased.

Many years later in the mid-15th century, the opportunity was taken to erect a new palace of brick with tiled roofs. A fair idea of what it may have looked like can be seen today in the Bishop of Lincoln's

grand abode at Buckden in Cambridgeshire.

The anonymous "Chorography of Suffolk", written in about 1600, describes the palace of the Bishops in Hoxne as "very fayre and gallant". The best description, however, can be seen in a map in the Suffolk Record Office of "Hoxon Newe Parke", drawn in 1619, and which shows "Hoxon Hall" in great detail.



The tree that would puzzle a monkey!

That apparently is how this tree got its popular name - a Victorian gentleman, when viewing a specimen with its spikey branches, was heard to exclaim, "Climbing that would puzzle a monkey!"

The home of the monkey puzzle, Latin name *Araucaria Araucana*, is South America - the mountains of Chile and parts of Argentina - and is thought to have been around with the dinosaurs.

The first monkey puzzles arrived in England around 1800 with a botanist and ship's surgeon Archibald Menzie, who helped himself to some nuts at a dinner party given by the president of Chile. Being a botanist, Archibald planted the nuts and kept them safe on board ship, where they germinated. He was able to give a fine specimen of one of the first monkey puzzles here in England to his fellow botanist, the famous Sir Joseph Banks.

Forty years later in 1844, our friend William Lobb, who introduced the Big Tree (see Village Voice April/May 2025), found these trees and collected seeds and cones on one of his plant expeditions in Chile, sending home a consignment to his employer Veitch Nurseries in Devon. Veitch was one of the most famous nurseries at that time, in the middle of the nineteenth century, so anything they grew and sold became very fashionable



for the Victorian gardeners. With this new tree, Veitch had started a craze and by the late nineteenth century you would have found a monkey puzzle in many front gardens of suburban Victorian villas.

Our climate does not really suit the monkey puzzle; they age quite quickly, probably not living more than a 100 years. But there is one fine example of an avenue of monkey puzzles in Exeter in Devon, originally



planted with seed collected by William Lobb. The avenue is at Bicton Park Botanical Gardens, which was once the home of the Rolle Family. It is said that after a few years of good growth, the trees had to be moved back because they scratched the occupants of the passing carriages!

Today the Bicton Park avenue is world renowned as the longest run of monkey puzzles in Europe. At just under a third of a mile, 500 metres, the avenue includes a champion tree standing at 26 metres, over 85 feet tall with a girth of four metres, just over 13 feet.

The monkey puzzle is now endangered and on the International Union for Conservation of Nature Red List, facing the risk of become extinct in the wild. The team at Bicton keep the avenue growing by propagating from the original trees' seeds or cones to fill in gaps, so there are some original trees standing next to new young ones. This special avenue keeps renewing and hopefully will be safe for many years to come.

But you don't have to go to Devon to see these trees, just look around at some of our gardens - and particularly when you next go into Diss. Just opposite Billingford Mill there is a fine example, but if you miss that there is another in Diss, just opposite Stuston Road on the north side of Victoria Road.

for a picture. Up high in the brambles Peacock butterflies were feeding. A Large Skipper came and rested on the brambles in the sun. They look much like moths and enjoy basking in the sun.



Large White butterflies were busy over the meadow together with the busy Meadow browns. On some damp ground a Large White settled, possibly to drink. As I walked back after sitting at the meadow, a Speckled Wood rested on the ground by some fallen sloes.



The woods are always full of life and that day was special. Time spent there always lifts my spirits and I went home amazed by the variety I had seen in just a short time.


STRADBROKE CRICKET CLUB



First a date for your diary; Saturday 13th September, at the village hall, the parish council along with other invited organisations will be hosting a session on 'Coping with Floods'. The session. between 10am and 1pm, will highlight ways in which residents can be prepared for any possible flooding due to adverse weather. (Remember Storm Babet?) Or perhaps reduce the effects of flooding to ourselves and our neighbours, for example reducing the extent of hard standing areas that many of us now have in our gardens. It will be in the form of an exhibition, so you do not have to be there all the time, just drop in and stay as long as you like.

It is hoped that a speaker from the River Waveney Trust will be giving a short talk on flood prevention measures. As part of this project the parish council will be publishing a leaflet to be delivered throughout Hoxne identifying ways in which we can be prepared for flooding, links to organisations that offer support and suggest ways in which we as villagers might help each other in such adverse weather conditions.

The parish council is still waiting to hear from the community traffic engineer on whether our proposals for managing traffic throughout the village will be possible and how much they are going to cost. In the meantime some of you may have noticed the new speed camera installed on Green Street which has, according to residents there, made an impact on motorists reducing their speed. The council is plainly doing something right.

A new Parish Clerk has been appointed to succeed Sarah Foote, who has served the parish council and the people of Hoxne so well for sixteen years. We thank

Sarah for her dedication and wish her well in all her future endeavours.

We're pleased to welcome Virginia (Ginny) O'Hegarty as our new Parish Clerk. She will take up her post on 1st August. The Parish Clerk is the lynchpin of everything the parish council does; without their support, the council could not operate effectively.
